



PURPOSE OF PROGRAM

Liberal studies is an associate in arts degree designed for students whose educational goal is to transfer to a four-year school to earn a Bachelor's degree or for students who are undecided about their educational or career goals. This flexible degree program is designed to help students complete their general education core requirements before continuing their education in a four-year degree program or in preparation for transfer into one of NMCC's technical or occupational degree programs.

Liberal Studies students may choose to enroll in the Advantage U Program which facilitates the transfer from NMCC to schools in the University of Maine System. Students will be connected with an advisor at the appropriate University of Maine System campus while attending NMCC. The advisor will help the student select courses which are most appropriate to the program curriculum.

Graduates of the Liberal Studies program will gain a strong foundation in the traditional disciplines of the liberal arts (math, science, social science and humanities). Through this carefully designed program, students will gain the knowledge, skills, and values that are essential for work and a lifetime of learning.

OPPORTUNITIES

This associate in arts degree option serves as a spring board for those who wish to enter higher education and complete either an associate or bachelor's degree. The earning power of college graduates is significantly greater than of those who do not complete a two or four year program.

ADMISSIONS POLICY

Completion of a four year high school program or a state high school equivalency certificate is required for admission into NMCC's liberal studies program. Two years of high school math is required; algebra I, algebra II, physics and biology with lab are desired. Students with previous college experience are requested to submit a copy of their transcripts with their application. A rolling admissions policy affords candidates the opportunity to apply and be accepted throughout the year, but early application (9-10 months prior to the school year) is recommended because of competition and strict enrollment capacities established for each program.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

The following procedures constitute the admissions process:

- 1. An application form must be submitted accompanied by a nonrefundable \$20 application fee.
- 2. An official high school transcript must also be submitted (current seniors' transcripts should include completed ranking periods).
- 3. GED/HiSET test scores must be submitted by applicants who are not high school graduates.
- 4. Official college transcripts must be submitted by applicants who have attended other colleges or post-secondary schools.
- 5. Placement testing or appropriate SAT scores, individual interviews and campus tours are required, in most cases, prior to being admitted.
- 6. Admissions decisions are made as quickly as possible once a candidate's file is complete.
- 7. Accepted applicants are required to make a deposit within thirty days of acceptance. Students requesting on campus housing are required to submit an additional deposit to reserve space in the residential complex.
