WATER TREATMENT TECHNOLOGY ➡

In response to an aging workforce and a statewide need for qualified personnel to operate more complex equipment in the water treatment facilities, NMCC is proud to host the state's first associate's degree program in Water Treatment Technology. In addition to the associate's degree, students may also pursue a certificate in both water and wastewater technology. The ribbon cutting for this program took place on October 11th and was attended by the Maine Department of Environment Protection Commissioner Paul Mercer. The programs are instructed by John Belyea, a licensed professional engineer. Belyea has worked in the engineering consulting industry since 1998.



what's new



NEW MEZZANINES IN PLUMBING AND HEATING ⬆

To better simulate students' ability to work in a two-story house or commercial building, NMCC has installed new mezzanines in the plumbing and heating lab. First year students can work "above" while heating students will install boilers on the lower level. According to instructor Loren Gordon, most projects in the field require dealing with multiple stories. Upgrading the mezzanines also improved the lab's safety, and with new lighting and other upgrades, the entire atmosphere has been improved. "It bought our training to a higher level," Gordon explains.

MAINTENANCE BUILDING ⬇

Prior to this year, the NMCC maintenance staff worked in one of the original 1942 military buildings on campus, which had issues with the roof, windows, air quality and heating. In an effort to improve work conditions, NMCC built a 2,500 sq-ft addition to the maintenance garage. The new facility includes office space, a plumbing and heating shop, a carpentry shop, and storage. In addition, NMCC upgraded the mechanical systems and the boiler. For easier access, new garage doors have been added which also upgraded the energy efficiency of the garage. Future plans include the demolition of the former military buildings.





◀ DESIGNING WITH STUDENTS IN MIND

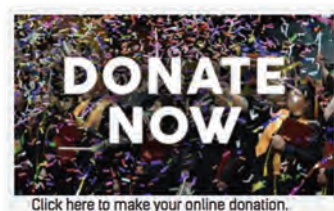
Adapting to meet our students' needs, NMCC has undergone a thorough facelift to some of the primary student resources available on campus. These changes have affected the Financial Aid office, Admissions, the Registrar, the Business office, and Academic Success Center. One of the most significant improvements came to the Admissions office, which relocated within the Christie Complex. With more space and a large waiting area, students can enroll and discuss their admissions very comfortably. The area previously occupied by Admissions is now home to Financial Aid. This new suite provides more privacy for students to discuss financial matters and complete paperwork such as the FAFSA application. The Academic Success Center relocated to the library, where they can be most beneficial to students seeking help. Finally, the Business office underwent a renovation and is now easily accessible to passing students.

▶ ALLIED HEALTH SIMULATION CENTER

One of our most exciting developments this year has been the new Allied Health Simulation Center, which officially launched on October 12th. This new state-of-the-art training center gives students access to life-like hi-fidelity mannequins designed to emulate real-life medical conditions. Instructors are able to adjust conditions from the nearby control rooms, and record results to give detailed debriefing afterwards. This program puts NMCC neck-and-neck with the most technologically advanced healthcare training facilities in the world.

DONATE NOW BUTTON ▶

Wouldn't it be nice if donating were as easy as the click of a button? Well now it is, with the Donate Now button on our homepage. Partnering with a third party company called Classy, we've been able to provide an instant way for donors to give to NMCC and designate their funds to specific causes. The goal is to remove all barriers to potential donors and make it as easy as possible to help ensure a bright future for the NMCC community.



LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSING PROGRAM

If you took time to review the history of NMCC, you would note that one of the first programs offered was a Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) Program. Later, an associate degree in nursing program became available and most students decided to continue their education to include the associate degree. Due to lack of enrollment, the LPN program was removed as an offering. However, we have all heard the startling news that something has to be done to increase the number of nursing staff to address our state's growing healthcare needs. NMCC has worked through the process with the Maine Community College System and the Maine State Board of Nursing to reinstitute the LPN Program. During the current academic year, faculty and staff will be working to implement a new LPN program.

NMCC CONNECT APP, PHASE II

When we launched the NMCC Connect app it was designed to help Admissions communicate with potential students. With a successful launch and hundreds of potential students inquiring through the app, NMCC is progressing to Stage 2. Stage 2 of the app development means adapting the app to meet the needs of current students as well as potential students. This means syncing up the app with our social media accounts and providing more convenient ways for students to get in touch with their academic advisors.

◀ EXPANSION OF WTT TO YORK COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The state's only Water Treatment Technology Program will be expanding to southern Maine. Through a cooperative agreement between NMCC and YCCC the WTT program will be offering courses via advanced technology to students at YCCC. Students will take all program specific courses through NMCC and may choose to take general education courses at either YCCC or through online courses offered at NMCC. Once again, NMCC is demonstrating that it is a leader within the Maine Community College System.

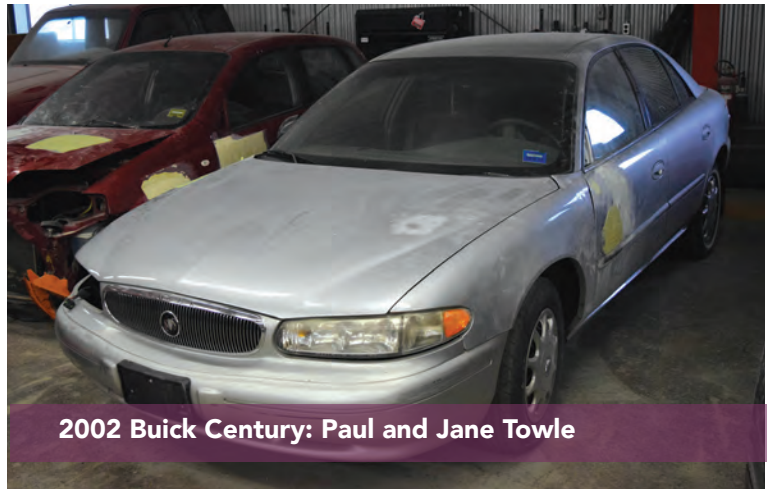
THE PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE OF

automotive technology

One industry, which has seen fast changes over the last few years, has been the automotive industry. The industry has moved from only gasoline engines to the addition of hybrids and now the introduction of electrical vehicles. Of course, along with each new model comes new technology on which automotive technicians must be trained, in order to provide quality service. Through a grant provided by Emera Maine, a General Motors' Chevrolet Volt electrical plug-in vehicle has been added to the Automotive Technology Program fleet. This new vehicle will provide the opportunity for training on advanced systems and will add to the delivering of hands-on training for the automotive technology students.

Another aspect of training, in which the hybrid/electric vehicle will be utilized, will be in the Emergency Services Program, which trains emergency medical paramedics. With electric vehicles gaining in popularity and growing numbers on roads and highways there is the increased probability of vehicular accidents involving an electric vehicle. Due to the nature of the electronic systems, extrication strategies of an accident victim in an electric or hybrid car are different from the processes used when a gasoline vehicle has been involved. Access to the hybrid vehicle for use by the EMS Paramedic students will add a new level of training to that program as well, which otherwise would not be available.

Throughout the year, several vehicles were donated to the automotive trades, including a Chevy Volt — a purchase made possible in part through a grant by Emera Maine.



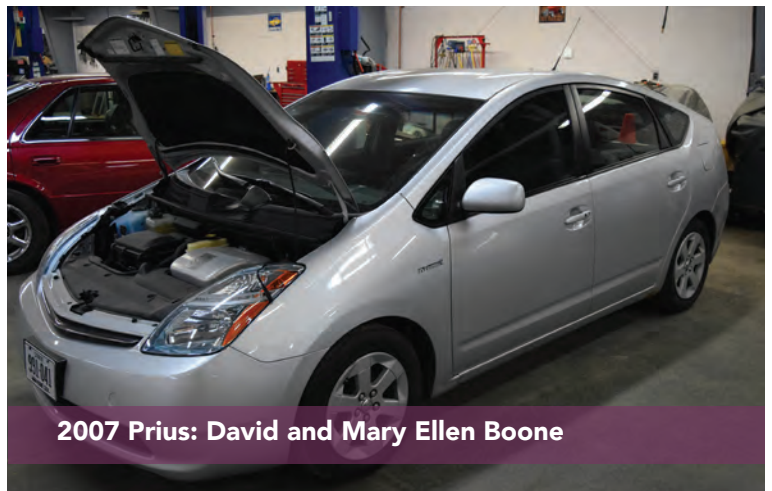

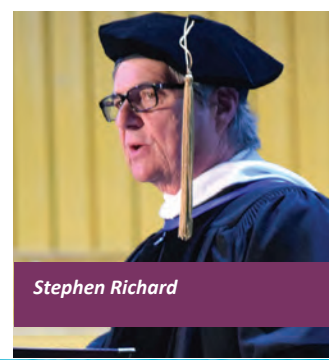


Commencement

AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

The Award of Excellence was presented to Jenny Morneault and Joseph Silliboy of Ludlow. This award honors students who have demonstrated high excellence for themselves, are creative thinkers, possess high standards of honesty and integrity, and have been an inspiration to others.

ACCREDITATIONS APPROVED

During the 2017-2018 academic year, both the College and the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Program completed the accreditation process. Each completed a required self-study, had visiting teams on campus and provided responses to initial reports submitted by the visiting teams. The College's accreditation through the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) was renewed for ten years. The Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs notified the College that the EMS Program's accreditation was renewed until 2023.

TOTALLY TRADES ➡

New Ventures Maine offered a hands-on, day-long event designed to encourage girls to consider careers in fields traditionally filled more predominantly by males. The Totally Trades Conference brought together over 100 participants from schools throughout Aroostook County. It featured sessions ranging from carpentry and heavy equipment operation to automotive technology and computer and networking technology, all which provided an opportunity for students to experience some aspect of the profession through practical exercise.



◀ SKILLS USA

Northern Maine Community College students went a perfect nine for nine in the medal count at the recent SkillsUSA Maine Championships held March 1 and 2 in Bangor. More than 900 college and high school trade and technical students from across Maine competed in more than seventy categories at United Technologies Center and Eastern Maine Community College.



OPEN HOUSE

In October 2017, an Open House was held for prospective students and their families. The event was held while classes were in session to provide visitors with the opportunity to experience working classrooms and labs. Tours of the campus and student demonstrations were also available. Visitors also met with admissions and financial aid staff.

STUDENT OF THE YEAR

The College awarded Elizabeth “Betsy” Allen with its highest student honor as the 2018 Student of the Year. Allen, along with one student from each of the other six community college campuses, was recognized at a ceremony in Augusta on April 25 hosted by the Maine Community College System Board of Trustees. Allen, a Nursing student, was selected by the NMCC faculty and staff based on her academic success, leadership, community involvement, and dedication to learning. The journey that brought Betsy to NMCC was one that involved fulfilling a life-long dream of becoming a nurse practitioner.



VISITING AUTHOR SERIES

In celebration of Community College Month and National Poetry Month, Northern Maine Community College hosted its annual Creative Writers' Reading Series held throughout the month of April. Creative Writing students participated in the events by reading from their original works, which included various pieces of poetry, fiction and non-fiction. The students' works touched on subjects such as relationships, religion, and interests such as car racing. Each session was highlighted by a guest author who shared excerpts from their books and took time to answer questions and offer insight. The sessions concluded with book signings. The guest authors for this year were Joan Dempsey, Jaed Coffin, and Aimee Baker.



NURSING PINNING

Twenty-three prospective new registered nurses, their faculty and families celebrated the annual Nursing Pinning Ceremony. The event serves as the milestone that signifies the official entrance into the nursing field for members of the graduating class. A family member or friend who has been a significant support during their education presents a nursing pin to each graduate.



A Life and Career Transformed

In 1977, a gallon of gas cost 63 cents, now it is closer to \$2.75. The Dow Jones was under a 1,000, today it is over 24,000, and the first mobile cell phone was still months from being unveiled. Much has changed, but one constant through that time is Betsy Harris, Northern Maine Community College's longest-serving employee.

Harris spent the past 28 years serving as Registrar, but her story at NMCC goes back a dozen more years when she was hired as a clerk.

"I remember when I began working at Northern Maine Vocational Technical Institute (NMVTI): there were only two new buildings, the Christie Building and Andrews Hall — all of the other buildings were old base buildings," said Harris.

Since that time, Harris has witnessed the growth of the campus with notable building additions such as the John Martin Building, Edmunds Building, and most recently, the Smith Wellness Center. But the most satisfying change to Harris, came in the form of the information technology revolution and a new student information management system.

"What a dream come true — it has certainly made my job responsibilities much easier," said Harris. "The combination of software and data improvements make it possible to organize and analyze data faster than when I first began."

Through the years, Harris has also seen changes in staffing as many employees have come and gone.

"I have worked with six Presidents and five Dean of Students and have enjoyed working under the direction of all of them," she said.

She has worked with current NMCC President Timothy Crowley for many of those years — 15 while he has been president.

"Betsy has made, and continues to make, an important contribution to the day to day operations of the College," he said. "Her ability to adapt and change as the Maine Community College System has changed over the past 40 years is amazing. Her high standards and ability to meet deadlines have been a trademark of her work and we are fortunate to have her as an employee and a leader at NM."

Harris says the College is much more than just brick and mortar. It's the people that make it what it is. She appreciates the support of administration, faculty and staff, but it's the students who win her heart.

"The greatest highlight is when students thank me for encouraging them to remain in school, when, in fact, they want to quit," she said. "It is an awesome feeling — knowing that they have reached their goals! The excitement and happiness on their faces, makes for such a proud moment on graduation day."

Over her 40 years, Harris has also noted some changes in the student population.

“Find your passion, if you really love what you do, you will find that your life is worth living and you will have true happiness.”

"Students' needs have certainly changed. They are trying to juggle family and job responsibilities, class scheduling, homework, etc.," said Harris. "It is very challenging. Life today is very different than what it used to be. It is very fast-paced. Students seem to be busier, struggling with everyday hectic schedules."

Harris knows her time at NMCC will eventually end, but doesn't want to dwell on the inevitable.

"As you travel down your path through life, one never knows what the future will bring," said Harris. "Life is short and fragile; so, don't take it for granted. Find your passion, if you really love what you do, you will find that your life is worth living and you will have true happiness. Also, choose a way of life that helps to make the world a better place."

Harris also reflected on her colleagues and the many opportunities given to her to grow and learn in her chosen profession, or as she would say, "her passion."

Dr. William Egeler, NMCC Dean of Students, says Harris has served countless individuals in her role as Registrar at the College.

"Her dedication and commitment to the students, the College and Aroostook County, in addition to her attention to detail, has served all well. We could not have a better person represent us in this capacity. Personally, I can always rely on Betsy's knowledge, integrity and loyalty for which I am always thankful and appreciative."

AMBER KELLEY CHARTING A ROAD LESS TRAVELED



Growing up in Caribou, Amber Kelley always loved to work with her hands, whether it was sculpting, painting or quilting; however, she never knew how to make a career of her talents. When it came time to choose a career path she chose a safe option: Business Administration. After taking courses part time for two years at NMCC, she decided that something needed to change. She didn't like not having a clear path after graduation, and her motivation was waning.

At the same time, Amber's father returned to school at NMCC after a medical condition limited his ability to drive trucks. After meeting instructor Dean Duplessis and seeing the Precision Machining Technology lab at NMCC, he was sure it was the right program for him.

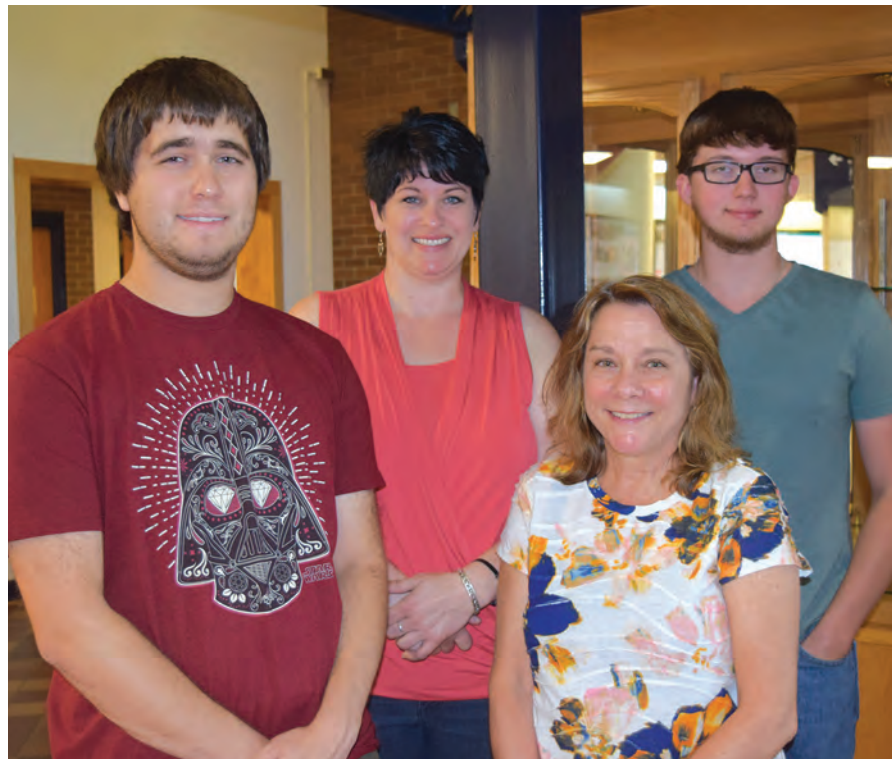
FREE-TUITION RAFFLE 2017 ➡

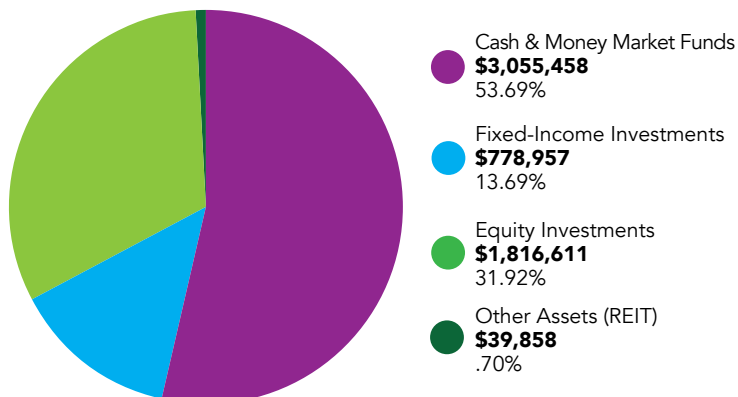

INVESTING IN INNOVATION

The 2017-2018 fiscal year for the NMCC Foundation began with a celebration. Early in the summer, Peter and Betty Briggs made a significant gift by forming a Charitable Remainder Trust (CRT) to benefit the Investing in Innovations endowment. A Charitable Remainder Trust is a deferred giving option that offers rewards to the donor and the charity and is a popular estate planning option.

It has been because of support like this that the Investing in Innovation funds have grown. The primary purpose for these funds is to help finance innovative projects that utilize or require technology, as opposed to funding new or replacement equipment that might otherwise be funded through College department budgets, if money was available.

Since its inception in 2008, the Investing in Innovation Fund has provided over \$37,000 for the purpose of supporting new and enhanced technology in the learning environment, whether classroom, shop or lab spaces.

Each fall, faculty members have the opportunity to apply for project funding. Members of the III Committee review the applications and conduct interviews as a part of the selection process.

A few examples of new and/or enhanced technology are: digital notepads; IV training arm and hand; paint conversion system; laser scanner; tool pre-setter; reflectometer; GoPro cameras; digital microscope and Snap-on diagnostic scanner. Of course, just having a listing doesn't come close to sharing the teaching and learning opportunities that have been afforded to the NMCC learning community because of these funds.

The Investing in Innovation Fund has supported various programs throughout the years. One of the projects awarded by the fund was for "clickers" requested by Nursing faculty. "Clickers" are designed to help students be active listeners and to improve critical thinking during lectures. The system allows instructors to ask interactive questions via PowerPoint and to collect all answers instantly. Depending on the accuracy of the answers, teachers can adjust instruction when necessary.
