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A statement of policy regarding the monitoring and recording via police agencies, of criminal activities by students at noncampus locations of student organizations that are recognized by the institution.

The use, possession, sale or distribution of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs is prohibited on college property or at college related events, as is being under the influence or knowingly in the presence of drugs or alcohol while on college property or at college-related events under the Student Code of Conduct.
