APPLICATION PROCEDURE

The following procedures constitute the admissions process:

- 1. Submit an NMCC application.
- Submit official high school transcript and/or HiSET/GED scores (current senior's transcript should include completed ranking period grades).
- 3. Official college transcripts for applicants who have attended other post-secondary schools.
- 4. If SAT scores are not available, placement testing may be required.
- 5. Meet with an Admissions Counselor.
- 6. A campus tour is highly recommended.

Note: Criminal history record search will be completed by NMCC personnel. Prior criminal convictions may preclude program admission or licensure.

PROGRAM PURPOSE

Emergency medical services is a program designed to meet the needs for well-trained Emergency Medication Technicians (EMTs) and paramedics. The program follows the National Emergency Medical Services Education Standards for Paramedic Education and meets or exceeds the national standards for minimum clinical, didactic, lab and field externship hours and competencies. The program is offered with ongoing approval from Maine Emergency Medical Services, is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Professions (CAAHEP), and follows the standards and guidelines of the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions (CoAEMSP).

The core EMS courses ensures the student is prepared to function as a competent EMS provider upon course completion and includes but is not limited to such content as the study of cardiac emergencies, emergency resuscitation, medical/legal issues, pharmacology, psychological emergencies, trauma, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, and neonatal care. A variety of clinical resources will be utilized to aid the education and preparation of the EMS student which include clinical rotations in the hospital/acute healthcare setting, field externships at ambulance services, as well as utilizing the Northern Maine Community College (NMCC) EMS simulation center.

- To be eligible for national AEMT and/or Paramedic certification, a cumulative average grade of '80', (B-) in all major EMS courses is required.
- Applicants who have not successfully completed (73 or higher) ALH 124 within the past 12 months are required to take the course and/or demonstrate competency through work experience.
- Not all courses are offered every semester.
- Clinical externships are faculty directed courses; students work with an assigned preceptor in various clinical rotations in both the hospital and prehospital setting.
- Students are responsible for the additional cost of Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Emergency Pediatric Care, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, and Prehospital Trauma Life Support. These courses are required to attain Paramedic Certification.
- Students wishing to use their financial aid for summer semester courses must indicate such on their financial aid application.
